The realization of anticipated income/ received fund as well as actual expenditure is carefully monitored by the bursar and the Finance Committee. Departments and other sections of the college which include office, hostel, library etc. prepare a requirement list for allocation of fund before the preparation of annual budget for consideration of the bursar, convener of the Finance Committee and accountant who are in charge of the preparation of annual budget. Again as and when requirement arises, a list of requirements is places before the Finance Committee by departments/sections of the college for necessary verification and analysis. 7.2 - Best Practices

- 7.2.1 Describe at least two institutional best practices
- 1. Our institution is located in a rural area where the majority of students come from agricultural families. Many of them belong to Tribal Communities and economically backward families. We conduct two types of Counselling for them Psychological counselling for the motivation of students and Career Counselling for guiding the students to achieve the future career goal. Special remedial classes are organised for slow learners. Slow and advanced learners are identified on the basis of classroom participation class tests and from results of examination. The teachers of different departments adopt strategies like academic counselling, psychological counselling, remedial classes and tutorials for the slow learners so that they can cope with other students. Tutorial classes are structured within the master time table of departments. Majority of the students are from rural background, most of them lack computer skills. Identifying this skill gap, Hands-on-Training programme in Computer and Spoken English are arranged for all sections of the students at the commencement of each new session. Parent-teacher meetings are organized by all departments through which parents are intimated about the academic progress of their wards. They are encouraged to share their observations about their wards as well as the institution. 100 percent online admission system, online fees payment, feedback and other academic and administrative activities to make the system more transparent. For Administrative purpose the college website has a separate section for dynamic notice and tenders for bringing transparency in the

administrative system. All the payment related transactions are through online mode using their unique student ID. The college possesses different committees for smooth administration. Some classrooms are provided with ICT facility, sound systems for better communication, central library, seminar library is well equipped for reference work of the teachers. Teachers are given support and encouragement for holding workshops and seminars, quiz, group discussion, use of CD library is done in some departments. An unique method when students become teacher is used on specific days in all the departments to make learning process interesting and participatory. 2. Students are encouraged to participate in various outreach programme and involve local rural primary students and children of nearby village in various activities of college like Sports, Cultural programmes and various festivals. The College believes in promoting overall development of students. The policy of the college is in tune with the national policy for sports. It reiterates the commitment of the college on all round development of students. To fulfill this, the college adopts the following strategies: Procedural and practical support to participate in all extra-curricular and co-curricular events for students at state, national and international levels are provided. Students are actively encouraged by their respective departments to participate in various Academic, Cultural and Co-Curricular activities on a regular basis. Departments regularly make an effort to raise the level of consciousness about relevant Social issues and Women's issues throughout the year by organizing different Seminars, Poster making competitions, Debates, Elocution Competitions on Women's issues. The N.S.S is dedicated to sensitization of the College students regarding their social responsibilities by organizing various outreach programmes for the nearby villages and underprivileged people. Debra College possesses green campus with beautiful garden and a large pond. A green initiative will influence the students both directly and indirectly in moulding their behavior. A green initiative will change the practice of using non-renewable energy. The pond in the college campus is maintained in friendly manner and used for organic pisciculture, Mashroom cultivation, vermicompost is done. Solar lights and rooftop solar power generation units are working. Vehicles are not allowed beyond a point after the main gate. The entire campus is a tobacco-free and plastic-free zone. The Green Campus committee monitors the cleanliness and green environment of the campus. It organises tree plantation events with NSS and UBA. The College makes an effort at organizing activities such as College Competitions in various categories like Singing, Dancing, Painting, etc. throughout the academic year. The College has an efficient Cultural Committee to Organize Co-Curricular activities. This Committee is responsible for organizing on a large scale various cultural functions such as The College Reunion, The Annual Function and Annual Cultural Competitions. Besides these the College also organizes several Cultural programs to observe The Independence Day, The Republic Day, International Women 's Day, World Environment Day, Banomahautsav, Bhasa Divas and other such important days. Apart from the Annual Sports, which is a regular event held every year with active participation from the students they are provided with various sports equipment to practice outdoor and indoor games throughout the year.
