

### Narrativising Healthy Coexistence and Humane Values: A Study of Kipling's Scientific Romance "007"

**Abstract**  $\blacksquare$  Rudyard Kipling's approach to the Empire was varied and multifaceted. 'Science fiction' or more specifically 'scientific romance' was one of the modes to convey his responses to the Empire. The most distinctive feature of "007" is the personification of locomotives and their spiritual union with the day to day affairs of human beings. In this he breaks away from the traditional science fiction, which deals with inventions and adventures to provide a more colourful account of life which in normal eyes looks achromatic.

Generally held as the spokesperson of the British Empire Joseph Rudyard Kipling (1865-1936) also laid his hands in other areas of literary creativity. One of his favourite genres was science fiction. Yet the stories of science fiction penned by Kipling are markedly different from those of other writers and bear Kipling's nature of making his protagonist succeed in accomplishing things in a collective manner. We scarcely encounter any scientist with futuristic machines performing unimaginable scientific feats in his stories. Even stories like "As Easy as ABC" (1912) which ostensibly show a disdain towards crowd and collectivity in general actually uphold the utilitarian motto - greatest good for the greatest number - by making the majority of the population beneficiaries of science and technology. Thus in spite of his outward display of a life blessed by science the narrative actually upholds humane values which are also intrinsic in the author. In some stories like "The Ship That Found Herself" (1895) the author seeks to romanticize the narrative by personifying the components of the ship and inculcating an in-group feeling by their works in unison. This spirit of this in-group feeling in turn will be used for the betterment of human beings. The modest object of the present article is to explore Kipling's shorter fiction "007" from this viewpoint.

Subtitled as "The Story of an American Locomotive" the story first made its debut in *Scribner's Magazine* in August 1897 and was collected in *The Day's Work* in the following year. As it has already been pointed out, Kipling's attempt to romanticize his story becomes evident by making °007, a new locomotive, as the protagonist and its interaction with other engines. Typical of Kipling's stories of schoolboys like that of the Stalky stories or regimental stories like "His Private Honour" (1891) or "The Big
